


The wildlife friendly garden

Lets talk Aphids!

There are about 600 or so aphid species in Britain that feed on a single genus or species of plant, where they suck phloem sap, and are not pests.

OK, aphids might not sound very appetising to us, but they're a crucial source of nutrition for a host of creatures, including spiders, ladybirds and other beetles, and lacewing and hoverfly larvae. In turn, aphids and their predators are food for some of our most familiar birds and animals, such as robins and blue tits, frogs and toads, and hedgehogs. That



means that these tiny, sap-sucking insects play a vital part in the food chain.

Swifts, the arrow-shaped birds that whoosh screaming over our homes in the summer at speeds of up to 70mph, are one of the birds that depend on aphid-eating insects – and they need our help. UK swifts have declined by 60% in the last 25 years and the huge decline in insect numbers is one of the biggest challenges they face. It's the same problem for some of our other birds, like house martins. Although you won't see swifts down on the ground eating insects – they do everything on the wing – what we do in our gardens and on our lawns and verges has an impact on the swifts in our skies.

Aphid colonies on wild plants are usually small and short-lived. This may be due to competition and natural enemies, but aphids are also 'self-regulating', so when their population outstrips resources, reproduction slows and winged morphs are produced that migrate to find more suitable hosts.

Gardens are ecosystems on our doorsteps. Encouraging a diversity of species and using products that don't harm that ecosystem can make a real difference. With some simple steps and a bit of love and care, we can create spaces that are great places to be for both ourselves and for wildlife. Even if you can't learn to love aphids, you can learn to love feeding them to their predators.





The Gardening Year

Leigh's seasonal tips and things to do in the Garden



May tips:

Summer is just around the corner but watch out for late frosts so perhaps put out your annual bedding later in the month. Remember to pinch out some of the growing tips, especially fuchsia to promote busy growth

The weeds will be growing so make sure you hoe them off regularly. If you fill your borders with lots of lovely perennial plants, the weeds will have no space left to grow and it will encourage more wildlife into your garden.

The leaves on early daffodils will be dying back so now is a good time to remove them. Leaving them late has allowed the bulbs to gain vital nutrients ready for next years flowers. If you have congested clumps of any spring bulbs you can lift and divide them to maintain vigour.

June:

If you are growing tomatoes remember to pinch out the side shoots of taller cordon varieties.

Hanging baskets and planters will need consistent watering and better early morning or late afternoon. This way it won't scorch leaves or evaporate in the midday sun.

Lightly prune any spring flowering shrubs, ensuring there is plenty of time for new growth to bring next year's flowers. June is a good time to prune wisteria and tie in any long shoots.

July:

Keep deadheading bedding plants and repeat flowering perennials to prolong the flowering period. If you cut back delphiniums and hardy geraniums after flowering you should get a 2nd flush of flowers. Feed your roses and keep removing faded blooms so they continue to flower.

The bulb catalogues will have arrived so perhaps order some bulbs to plant in the autumn & sow biennial seeds like foxgloves, forget-me-nots & wallflowers for next year's plants.



Weigh all ingredients in the washed-out yoghurt pot

- 1 small pot of plain yoghurt
- 3 pots self-raising flour
- 2 pots caster sugar
- 1 pot vegetable oil
- 3 eggs
- 1/2 tsp almond essence

Preheat the oven to 170 degrees C

The loaf tin will take $1\frac{1}{2}$ hrs at 170 degrees C

The tray bake will take less time, test with a skewer, when it comes out clean, the cake is ready

This mix does not hold fruit well, but I have made cherry and almond, date and walnut, coconut and chocolate versions







FOOTS BARN THEATRE Part 1

Sample chapter by Hon. Oliver Isaac Foot
1st of March 1971. I was 25. Two Big Hertz
trucks roaring in convoy across Salisbury Plain.
Heading for Cornwall. In one-- six musicians
and their equipment. Some doubled as
actors. Proper ones, trained at East 15 acting
school in London. I was in the other with my
wife Nancy, our one year old daughter,
Mary-Rachel, and 6 actors. Proper ones
again-- these trained at Jacques Le Coque
school of mime in Paris (the ultimate mime

school that trained Marcel Marceau--but we didn't like Marceau- he had sold out-- became too commercial) and The Drama Studio in London where on leaving I had been awarded Best Actor. The only thing I had ever won. The adrenaline was strong. We were powered by our altruistic beliefs. It was happening man! We were doing it man! On our way to create a new order in life. We were to live an ideal, as a community on a farm and establish the only professional theatre company in Cornwall. We would mirror Shakespeare's time, by taking shows out to village halls, town halls, church halls, car parks, pubs, beaches, schools and art centres-- wherever we could find or create an audience. We were going to be famous our way -- which was to be infamous. We were all into Eastern Religions-sort of--we were all vegetarians --sort of. Jon -Paul the mime who had trained in Paris liked his meat. He needed it he said --so he could back flip, walk the tightrope and ride his unicycle--for strength. So we allowed him a piece of meat now and then although it upset the very committed among us-- you know--bad karma.

This had been planned for years. We were Foots barn Theatre. Named after me --have no idea how I wangled that. Our mission was wrapped in this statement. "Unlike television, theatre brings people together in the same room, in rural areas it can serve as a focal point for the Community in much the same way as the Church, the town fair, and the pageant of old. To this end, Foot's Barn would style itself as a grass roots theatre with elements of circus, mumming mime and Comedia del'Arte, a theatre for the Cornish folk." You see-- we were serious man.

Therefore, the brain believes we are managing our stress well and can do it again, transferring this to everyday life and allowing us to manage our daily stress.

When a group of people experiences adversity, it bonds them, they overcome something together, and it builds resilience and confidence. Many studies prove a positive mindset improves recovery from illness, resilience helps us combat depression, and friends and community give us support and the feeling of being part of something. Whatever the reasons for the increase in cold water swimming, you'll find when you talk to the swimmers they experience happiness, peace, and community, all of which improve their quality of life.

Cold Water Swimming

Recently there has been a huge rise in people taking up cold-water swimming. You'll find a lot of articles claiming many great things about getting into cold water. The facts at this present time are that there are no facts! There are no studies that can categorically prove anything.

However, go down to the beach and talk to some cold-water swimmers, and you'll find people who have managed to reduce their anti-depressants, people who are experiencing pain relief, people finding relief from arthritis pain and swelling, and those who have found a reduction in their stress and anxiety levels.

There are many theories as to why this is happening, and we're going to look at some of the science behind it and some of the not-so-scientific views.

The science is that when we enter cold water below 15 C, we experience the cold-water shock response. This means we get a hit of adrenaline and a hit of cortisol; the heart will beat faster, blood pressure will rise, and we will breathe very rapidly. In effect, our body believes it's in grave danger, and so it goes into fight or flight mode. That's the science bit—the bit we can scientifically prove.

The not-so-scientific bit is why all of this makes us feel great. When our body releases adrenaline, it will make us feel good; this natural high can last all day.

When our body reléases cortisol (because it is under stress) our brain can't tell we have put ourselves in a stressful situation on purpose. Therefore, the brain believes we are managing our stress well and can do it again, transferring this to everyday life and allowing us to manage our daily stress.

The cold is believed to help manage pain and reduce swelling. For sufferers of autoimmune diseases (where the body attacks itself), the belief is that because the body's primary aim is to survive, it will stop attacking itself because it has gone into fight-or-flight survival mode, and staying alive is far more important.

As we begin to enjoy the experience, our body will also release dopamine, which is responsible for our feelings of reward, pleasure, and motivation. Dopamine is significant as it encourages us to continue to engage in activities that make us fulfilled and happy, bringing us back to the cold-water time and time again.

We had opened in London and done a week at St. Mary Abotts Theatre, Kensington with Becketts Endgame. We wanted to end the game before the Real thing. We were on our way to do the Real Thing. Through my Aunt Jill Craigie, Michael Foot's wife, Stanley Kubrick came along and wrote me a letter-- he liked our Endgame. He was casting "Clockwork Orange". But we were not into the commercial film world--no the Real Thing. Live our talents--FOR REAL.

Trewen, in St Keyne near Liskeard Cornwall was our home. A Victorian house where the single people lived and the couples lived in different caravans and units sprawled across the seven acre farm---Andy and Angie lived in the converted cider press, Jon Paul and Serena lived in a caravan, Maggie and Terry lived in a shed at the top of a field which became our kitchen garden. Nancy, Mary-Rachel and I lived in one end of the barn that had been converted into two upstairs bedrooms a kitchen downstairs and a small office. The Barn was where we would rehearse.

Tom Wildy the musician and actor had been left £6000 pounds which he put down to buy the property and I was responsible for a £6000 mortgage. We were co-owners, partners. Even though I had no money I became the owner of a farm at the age of 25. This was something else. Beyond all hippy dreams.

We would buy all our food in bulk: sacks of brown rice, beans, hundred weights of cheese ,whole grain flour, gallons of soya sauce, buckets of peanut butter, wheat germ etc. etc. No milk was allowed. Though some of us would creep off and buy a pint now and then and drink it in a village alley way.

Community meetings were held every week when we would discuss essential stuff like who would cook, how much cheese each member should get, who was responsible for cleaning, cutting the grass etc.--no one looked forward to them -- difficult but necessary.

No one was paid. It was my responsibility to put £25 in the kitchen of the main house every Monday for members to take what they need for essential personal needs--you know a toothbrush or the odd piece of clothing. That lasted for a couple of weeks until members would come to me before the Monday and beg advances. Yes this was our ideal.

Trust each other ---everyone equal.

ANNUAL REPORT 2023-24

Welcome

We welcomed two new Members onto the Parish Council. Roger Cook joined in July 2023 and Patricia Hopwood joined in September 2023. Their inclusion ensured that we maintained a full complement of nine Councillors. It is very reassuring that we have residents keen to volunteer their time and energy as Parish Councillors and make a contribution to the life of the community.

The Informer

We re-launched the 'Informer' quarterly Community Magazine in December 2023. The old 'Informer' hadn't been published regularly since our local volunteer Editor, Val Bourne, retired, so the Parish Council took the lead in producing the new 'St Keyne and Trewidland Informer'. We are very pleased to be receiving little articles from local residents and lots of information about events happening throughout the Parish.

Facebook

We also launched a Parish Council Facebook page. Our aim is to provide information for local residents using different ways of communicating and our Facebook page is already reaching lots of you. We get data from our Facebook page showing how many people are looking at our 'posted' messages – so we can see which 'posts' are the most popular. This gives us important feedback on which issues are the most important to our community and will help to inform our future priorities. For example, our posts about Road Safety generated a great deal of interest.

Budget


Every year Councillors vote to approve the Parish Council budget for the following year and to set a 'precept' (local Council tax) that will be charged to local residents as part of their Council Tax for the following year. For 2024-25 we were pleased to be able to make no increase in the precept for the second year running. Bearing in mind current financial pressures on households we were determined not to increase the precept and to make efficiencies elsewhere in our spending.

Local 'Infrastructure'

We have been using our Parish Council budget reserves to purchase new 'infrastructure' across the Parish to ensure that our local facilities, however small, are replaced and improved. These have included: a bespoke new entrance at St Keyne Lawn Cemetery; new outdoor Noticeboards for Trewidland Village Hall and St Keyne Lawn Cemetery; four new roadside Grit Bins in St Keyne; a new field gate on the public right of way (FP607/19/1) from Lower Town to Lake in Trewidland; and roadside planting at various locations in the Parish.

The Farming Diary

As a community that is surrounded by agriculture, but for the most part having little involvement in it nowadays, we thought it might be useful for the people of St Keyne and Trewidland to have a brief insight into the agricultural



Spring

Although we've now entered meteorological spring, it isn't immediately apparent that spring has sprung! At the time of writing in early April, we've already had half our annual rainfall, and we've had the wettest 18 months on record. Winter crops that were sown in autumn have known nothing but relentless rain. This has seen a proliferation of pests such as slugs and disease, and at the same time, limited our ability to deal with these problems. Harvest is already looking like it will be a little disappointing.

In the next few days, dung will be spread and worked into the fields destined for spring oats, and the oat seed will be planted. Not long after that, we will prepare two fields for "Winter Bird Food" as part of our Sustainable Farming Incentive agreement. This will be a mixture of seeds that will be allowed to grow and set seed during the autumn to provide a food source to birds over winter.

Lambing starts at the end of march whatever the weather. We had a rough start with a few losses but, now we are in the thick of lambing, things seem to be going well. We deliberately lamb later than many to take advantage of warmer conditions and increased spring grass growth.

As we lamb entirely outdoors, the solar panels have been an absolute life saver for new born lambs, providing valuable shelter from the unseasonal wind and rain. Fortunately, our Romneys are bred to thrive in tough conditions and we have the beginnings of a strong and healthy crop of lambs. As spring continues, their mothers will produce good milk off the spring grass to help them thrive.

Road Safety

We have been working with Cornwall Council Highways and the Road Safety Team for Cornwall and the Police in a bid to improve safety for road users on the B3252 at Horningtops and Bylane End junctions. There have been several serious accidents, including two fatalities near the Bylane End junction within the past three years. We have pressed the relevant agencies to ensure that positive changes should arise from these tragic accidents to protect road users now and in the future. Following our discussions we are pleased that improved new warning signs and road markings have been installed and speed monitoring has been taking place. The impact of the new signage and the information from the speed monitoring will be kept under review with the relevant agencies and additional safety measures may arise as a result. Road safety along the B3252 remains a high priority for the Parish Council.

Safeguarding

We have developed and adopted a policy for safeguarding children and vulnerable adults. Although the Parish Council is not one of the primary safeguarding agencies it is essential, as a public body, that we respond appropriately when a potential safeguarding issue is brought to our attention. We will promote the welfare of children, young people and adults, and work together with other agencies to ensure that there are adequate arrangements in place within the Parish Council to identify and support those who are suffering harm. The Parish Council has identified one Councillor to act as the 'Designated Person' for Safeguarding, to whom concerns and incidents should be reported, and all Councillors have undertaken 'in-house' training. Having the policy in place enabled us to respond on two occasions during the year to concerns brought to our attention.

Housing and Development

Local developments, including Housing, are relatively small scale in our Parish, but they can still have a major impact on the local community and surroundings. Consequently we spend a lot of time carefully considering the details of new applications. While Cornwall Council are the decision maker on Planning matters, we are always consulted for our views and they take our comments into account.

We have considered 15 planning applications this year. Three were extensions or alterations to existing houses; two were to create houses from old stone barns; two were single house new builds; two were to create storage buildings; and there was one 'change of use' from holiday let to residential. In addition there were 5 'Class Q' applications. 'Class O' is a planning application to turn a farm building into a house without the usual planning restrictions and permissions applying.

The Parish Council has no right to comment on these and even Cornwall Council has very limited scope to object. Unfortunately non-farming developers have spotted this loophole and buy up recently redundant farms to turn all the agricultural sheds and barns into houses. While this brings essential new housing to the market, it does so without the usual scrutiny. For example, the Parish Council would have objected to the 5 recent Class Q applications because the new houses appear to be overcrowded on the site and there do not appear to be any of the houses which could be classed as 'affordable' for local people.

We are also keeping our eye on a site along the East Looe River, between Trussel Bridge and St Keyne Station, which is being used as a storage and maintenance site by a Construction Company. Our objections to this development were upheld by Cornwall Council and by the National Planning Appeals body. The matter is now with Cornwall Council Planning Enforcement, but the site remains in use and is both an environmental hazard and an eyesore

Neighbourhood Development Plan

The Parish Council has supported the on-going work to produce a Neighbourhood Development Plan for Dobwalls and Trewidland although we have had no direct involvement as it was begun by Dobwalls and Trewidland Parish before Parish boundaries were changed. However we welcome it's acceptance by recent public vote. We are grateful for the huge amount of work on its development over several years by people in our Parish, particularly Mhairi Mackie in Trewidland. It will be a useful tool in our future consideration of planning applications in Trewidland.

Living in our Parish


We are blessed to be surrounded with an abundance of wildlife so if you're not seeing it then chances are that you are just not looking.




