I have just been to Penhale Pantry to have breakfast with the "marquee and gazebo crew" who help us with all the jobs that need heavy lifting and transporting in the village, Syd Meagor

and Co, to whom we are deeply indebted for all their help. We all sat there melting in the heat of the shade and it's 32 degrees! I wonder what the weather will be like when you read this. For those of you who don't know (and if you don't where have you been?) the marquees and gazebos were from the Trewidland Summer Fayre. This was an incredibly successful event, even if I do say so myself. Not only was the weather glorious, but so many people came along and stayed to enjoy the day, sitting in our mini orchard or by the Buffalo's Arms enjoying a cool cider or beer to the sounds of the steel pans. The Drought Resistant Garden

I don't know about you, but I love this time of year when everything is in bloom and the garden is looking its best. But the continued hot weather and lack of rain has certainly taken its toll. Some leaves are very scorched, plants looking a bit droopy and some outright distressed. The constant watering is also a bit of a chore.

As our summers become warmer and drier, should we be looking for plants that need less watering while still providing colour and interest? Drought-resistant gardening is all about choosing the right plants, improving your soil and making the best use of available water.

Adding compost or well-rotted manure helps the soil retain moisture, while a layer of mulch reduces evaporation during hot weather. Watering deeply once or twice a week encourages plants to develop strong roots that are better able to cope with dry conditions. Collecting rainwater in a water butt is another simple way to conserve water. South West Water sometimes has these at reduced prices on their website.

Many frost-hardy plants thrive in dry conditions once established. Good choices include Lavender, Catmint (Nepeta) although mine always get eaten by cats, Yarrow (Achillea), Sea Holly (Eryngium) a personal favourite of mine and bees like it too, Sedum 'Autumn Joy', Rosemary, Sage, Verbena bonariensis, Stachys (Lamb's Ear) and Coneflower (Echinacea). Ornamental grasses such as Feather Grass (Stipa tenuissima) also add movement and texture with very little maintenance.

Many of these plants are rich in nectar, making them excellent for bees, butterflies and other pollinators. By choosing drought-tolerant, frost-hardy varieties, you can create a beautiful, wildlife-friendly garden that copes well with increasingly dry summers.

were volunteered to help on a games stall, bar or elsewhere. The Welly Wanging became very competitive and the winner of the men's competition threw their welly into our neighbours' field! (I laughed when I was asked what would happen if it went over the fence.) The Fun Dog Show had fewer classes this year due to there being very few dogs last year, but this was fortunate because of the heat. Mack won the best in show and received a stained glass trophy. At the time of this going to print, the initial figures suggest we took in the region of £2,500 and made a profit, with gift aid, of almost £2,000. This year was so much easier thanks to the large number of people who helped and I've already had some new ideas for 2027!

Not only did Pantastic Steel Band perform at the Fayre, but they also played at Hannafore Kiosk and on the Platt in Port Isaac raising money for the rebuild project of the hall. The latter has begun, albeit slowly, after stalling on the bat inspections. Huge thanks to Lindsey Ellis for saving us £2,000 on the necessary bat emergence surveys required since the discovery of bat faeces in our loft spaces. Enormous thanks to the parish council for helping us with the funding and also to the Lyskerris Fund for awarding us £5,000 towards our work.

Trewidland Hall has a variety of events planned over the coming months to appeal to all tastes and ages so if you haven't already seen them on the website or social media this is what you have to look forward to. August 12th sees the welcome return of the Talland Quartet, who received incredible reviews last time they performed with us. The audience could not believe that such a high calibre of musicians could be heard here in our tiny village in the middle of nowhere. I have been engaging with the developers for several months to make sure local conditions are properly considered. This includes infrastructure, the impact on neighbouring residents, Looe Academy, traffic at school times and the operation of the Go Cornwall Bus service. As an early step, I arranged a meeting in April so the developers could explain and discuss their emerging plans with local stakeholders, including Looe Town Council and Councillor Candy.

More importantly, the developers have agreed to my request for a full public meeting where residents can question them directly and make their views clear. I have asked for this to take place after the summer, when more people are likely to be available.

The provision of genuinely affordable housing is welcome in principle. Any application will still need close examination of highways, drainage, landscape impact, ecology, access to services and the combined effect of the housing and retail proposals.

News from Truro

Changes to cash payments in council car parks

From 1 August, payment machines in many Cornwall Council car parks will stop accepting cash. Card, contactless, JustPark and Buzzpay payments will remain available.

The Council says almost 90 per cent of parking transactions are already cashless and that the change should save around £80,000 a year. Cash payments will remain available at 43 car parks across Cornwall.

I raised concerns about the impact on older residents, people without bank cards or smartphones, and town-centre businesses. I am pleased that cash will continue to be accepted at Millpool car park in Looe and Seaton Park car park.

New Crisis and Resilience Fund

Cornwall Council has launched a new Crisis and Resilience Fund to replace the Household Support Fund and the former Crisis and Care Awards scheme.

The Council has been awarded £8.25 million for 2026/27. The fund can provide emergency financial help, support with essential household costs, housing-related assistance and referrals for debt, benefits and employment advice.

A further £1.5 million has been made available to support qualifying households facing increased heating-oil costs. Eligible residents can receive a one-off payment of up to £300.

This support may be particularly important in rural communities where homes are not connected to mains gas. Residents facing an immediate financial crisis should check the eligibility rules or contact the Council's benefits team on 0300 1234 121.

Local News

Proposed housing and retail development at Barbican Road
Proposals are being prepared for a substantial mixed-use development on land east of Barbican Road in Looe.

The current proposal is for up to 86 homes, comprising 61 social rented properties and 25 shared ownership homes. All are described as "affordable", although that label alone does not tell us enough. I will be working to prioritise local families, working people and younger residents who might otherwise be unable to remain in Looe.

A separate proposal would provide a retail store with the potential to create up to 40 jobs.

So do come and check it out, the structure of our 4 services each month is:

1st Sunday service of the Word

2nd Sunday service of the Word with Ron Benett

3rd Sunday Holy Communion with Rev Mark

4th Sunday café Style

All of these are at 9.30 am and followed by refreshments.

Then every 5th Sunday we meet at 10.30 at Dobwalls when we join all our congregations together across the benefice. Our next is Sunday 30th August.

As we prepare for summer, I have been drawn to the words of Psalm 121 which remind us whatever is happening in our lives, God is looking and living in us. I am really struck by these words in Psalm 121:

I lift up my eyes to the mountains—
where does my help come from?
My help comes from the Lord,
the Maker of heaven and earth.

This reminds us to look towards God and all that is happening, both the good and the challenges and know he is walking with us. This may encourage you but also you may have some big questions about this, with this in mind we would love to invite you to a course called the Alpha course which is running from September at St Martins Church, 10 weeks on a Wednesday evening and you get your evening meal, you watch a video and then get to ask lots of questions or get to listen to lots of questions about faith or as their tag line goes ask the big questions of life. This is something we are seeing this year: people wanting to know there is more to life, who God is? Why are our footballers such as Saka and Eze saying Jesus is my life in interviews? Maybe this year is the year for you to ponder those questions.

We look forward to seeing you over the summer months.

Many of you will be enjoying the heatwave whilst others are struggling to cope. The last few weeks have been a busy time for me as we experience this long dry spell of weather, this has delivered me a set of different problems to solve other than the usual floods, drains and fallen trees.

Many farmers told me at the Liskeard Show that it has been good to bring in their silage,

hay and maybe an early harvest, but difficult too, as the pastures are dried up and milk yields reduced and other crops struggling.

At the recent AGM for the South East Cornwall I was pleased to accept nominations to return me as the Chairperson. This allows me the privilege to represent the 29 SE Cornwall parishes at all levels and often involves discussions with MPs, National Highways, MOD, Dept for Transport, Devon and Cornwall Police and other agencies about our area. National Highways gave a presentation at the meeting about their proposals to make the A38 safer between Liskeard and Trerulefoot. This includes closing off the many right hand junctions. We need to look carefully about the impact this will have on the villages and narrow rural roads that will be traversed to gain access to the A38. There will be public consultations, please do attend and make your views known at the time.

At a recent meeting of the Joint Tamar Bridge and Ferry Crossings the committee voted unanimously to reject the proposal to increase the TAG administration fee. We continue to lobby MPs to understand that we want a toll free crossing and that the people of SE Cornwall cannot shoulder the burden of the cost any longer. I shall be attending a peaceful march across the bridge on the 25th July, where I will use the opportunity to talk to as many users as possible.

I acknowledge and appreciate the tireless, brave work that all of our emergency services do in our local community, I attend Safer Liskeard meetings with the Police, Fire and other agencies regularly. Recently, the Coastguards Rescue Service had been under threat as the Marine Coastal Agency had decided to reset their terms of reference and not remunerate them when on an emergency call out.

We have 422 miles of coast line and they attend all cliff, water, mud rescues, abseil down cliffs, recover bodies, assist bomb disposal and sometimes they can be out searching for days and mostly nights in

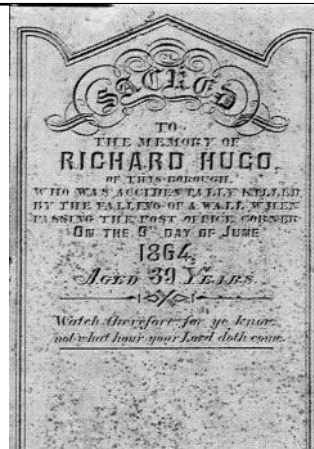

TERRIBLE CALAMITY AT LISKEARD RICHARD HUGO (1825-1864)

Richard Hugo was baptised in the parish of St Keyne on November 27th 1825. At the age of 15 he was employed as a 'Male Servant' by William Miner, a 'Farmer' in the parish; Miner also employed a 15-year-old 'Female Servant' named Elizabeth Congdon. The marriage of Richard Hugo (aged 24) and Elizabeth Mary Verran (aged 18) was registered in Liskeard on September 15th 1850. Richard and Elizabeth settled in Trewidland village and a daughter named Mary arrived the following year; at this time Richard was working as a 'Lead Miner', most probably in one of the Lead/Silver mines at Herodsfoot. Another change of employment came when the building of the Liskeard & Looe Railway began, Richard was taken on as a 'Railway Labourer' until the line opened in 1860.

Richard was aged 38 and married with six young children when the Cornish Times reported on a 'Terrible Calamity at Liskeard'. While in the employ of Mr. Sargent, solicitor of Parade House, Richard was killed by the falling of a wall when passing the Post Office corner on June 9th 1864. Another man and two five-year-old children also died at the scene. The Post Office on the corner of Dean Street and Barras Street was being demolished at the time and as workmen were dismantling a massive chimney, it and an outer wall collapsed into the street, resulting in the four deaths. The Cornish Times reported that 'feeling was running high in the town and John Bone, the builder, was lucky to escape official blame for the careless way the demolition work was carried out. To make amends, he paid the funeral expenses of the four deceased'. At their own request the fees of the jury and the witnesses at the inquest were given to Hugo's widow. A full account of the accident and the inquest can be found in 'Liskeard Seen Through the Census' by William Harwood.

Drop-In Meditation Classes Liskeard

Having been asked to write a few words about my experience of a local group that I attend each week in Liskeard, (it was suggested that I may use Artificial Intelligence to

help me write it, however I've always believed in writing from the heart, and as AI doesn't have one of those, I've been fearless and just gone for it, without any interference from AI...)

I can honestly say that my life has completely transformed since attending the meditation classes, and the best way to explain this transformation is by finding a friend, and in almost seven years of knowing that friend, they have become a key part of my everyday life. The year the club was founded coincided with the Japanese Year of the Boar (I-Doshi), from which it takes its name.

I initially started in Callington Sports Centre with limited success then moved to Trewidland Village Hall. It was amazing how successful the club was, from day one. Many signed up - adults and children from the village but also from Liskeard, Looe and Callington.

A regular class of 15 - 20 students wanted to learn the ancient Japanese combat art of the samurai warrior, which includes traditional techniques and self defence, both armed and unarmed. It's suitable for any age, can be adapted for all abilities and is great for improving fitness, balance, concentration, confidence as well as having other benefits. The success was such that I even opened satellite clubs in Looe, St Keyne, Taphouse, Menheniot and Pelynt.

Over the years I trained many people to black belt level and beyond. Some of whom now teach in their own clubs. Additionally the club has often networked with other ju jitsu and karate clubs in our region, organising various courses in support of charities, for example women's self defence, larger seminars and tournaments.

COVID was a challenging time for us all including martial art clubs. We carried on in between lock-downs and when necessary did Zoom Sessions for the most dedicated students; (a lot can be achieved with solo training).

Post COVID I didn't try to reinstate the club to its previous attendance levels, and now I'm close to retirement I prefer to have a

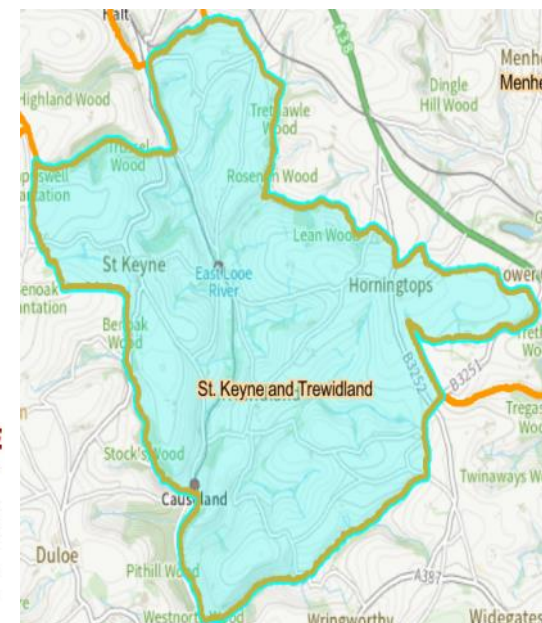
