

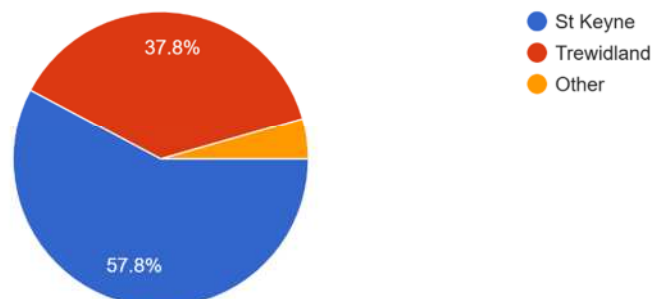

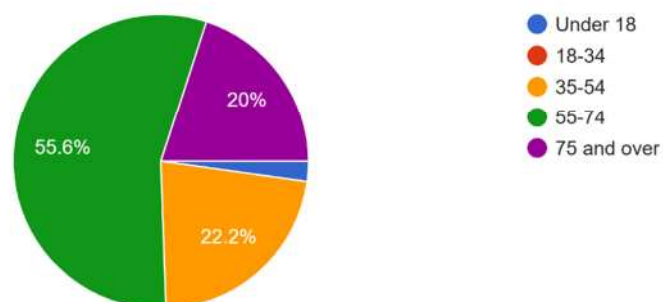
Please indicate where you live

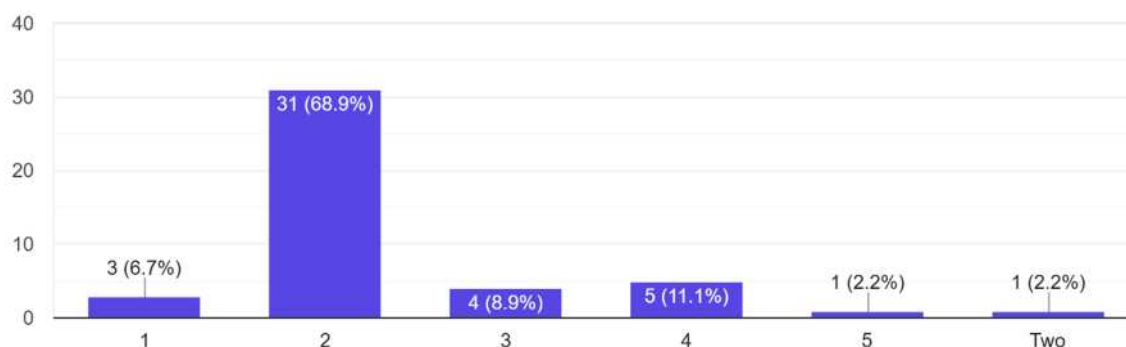
Please indicate your age bracket

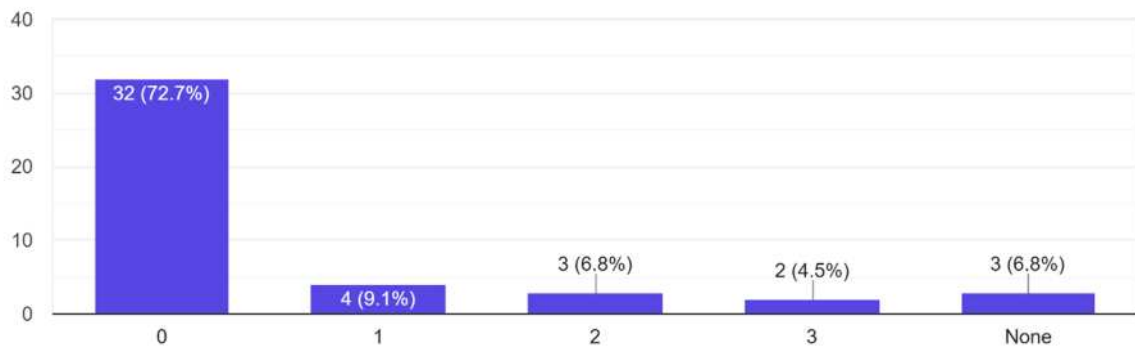
Please indicate how many persons live in your household

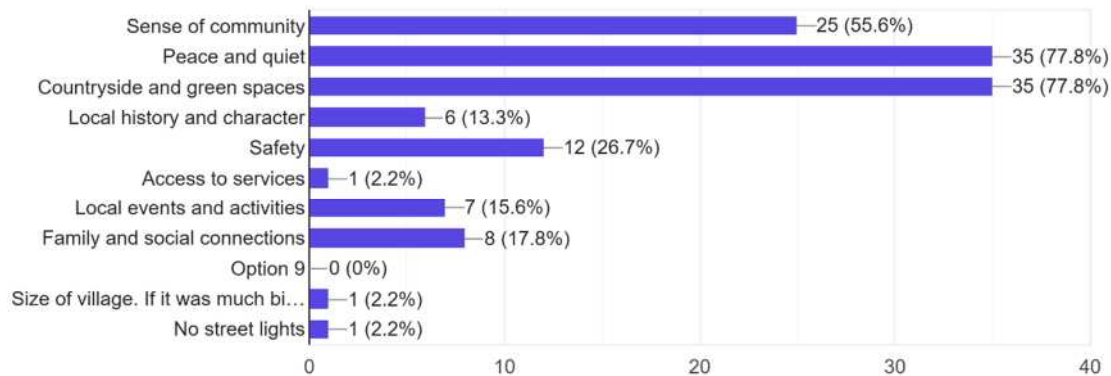
Please indicate how many dependents live in your household

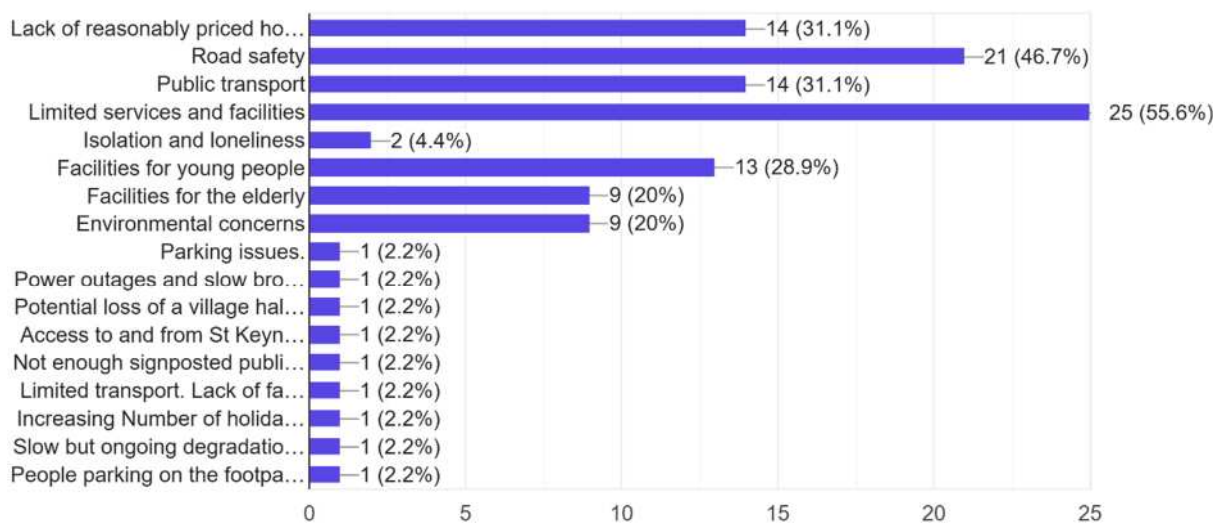
What do you value most about living in or being part of the parish? Choose 3.

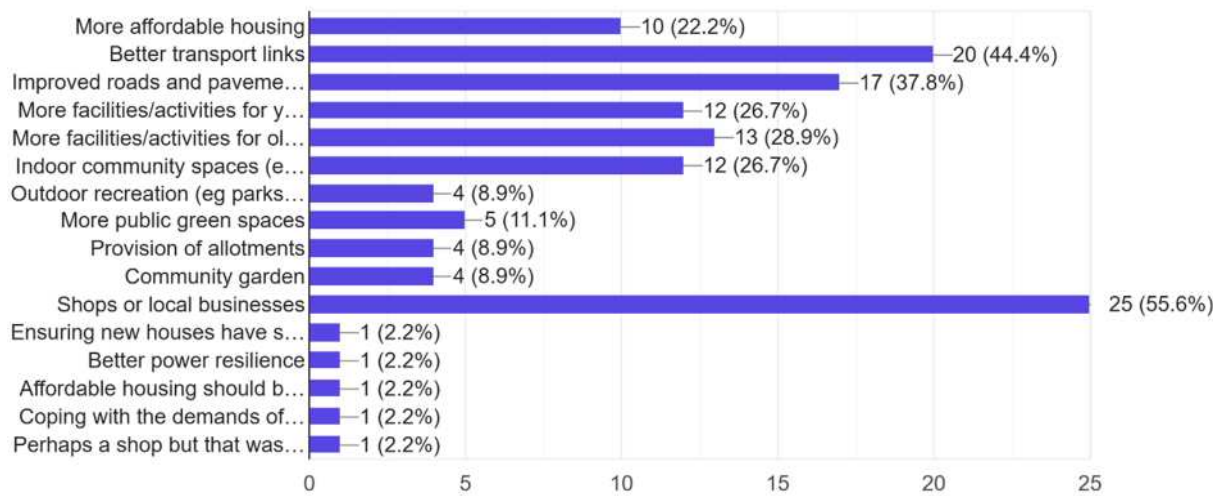
What are the biggest challenges facing the parish today? Choose 3.

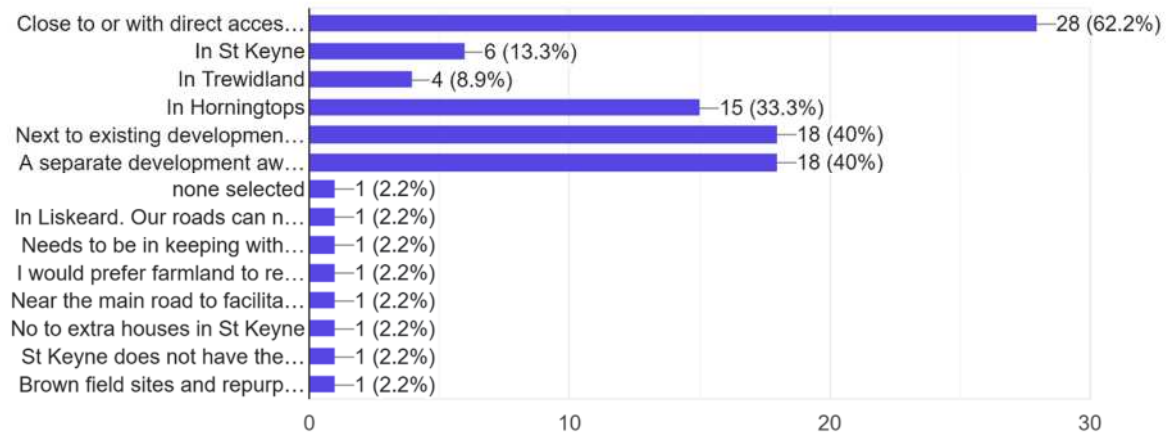
What will be most needed in the parish over the next 10 to 30 years? Up to 2050. Choose 3.

23 responses

- Must keep green spaces. If you are to allow new homes, start not with a development but small builds. We don't need to be a town. Don't let Cornwall Council push you around.
- I think the local council should be more proactive in keeping the . The hedges are so overgrown that you have to walk in the road if you have a wheelchair or pushchair or if you need an arm for stability. Cars are beginning to park on the paths in Valley view especially on the blind bends.
- Any future developments should be confined to areas directly connected to Liskeard where the infrastructure for them already exists. Our roads busy and restricted enough as it is without adding more commuters to them. The only thing St.Keyne would benefit from would be some form of shop so as to reduce traffic/journeys to Liskeard.
- Better power resilience faster broadband
- Work on opening up footpaths is appreciated. More green space/off road walking would be excellent around Trewidland.
- A more consistent measure to ensure roads are fit for purpose by keeping hedges maintained better.
- Community shop as access for older people can be isolating. Duloe and Dobwalls are good examples of small shops that works. Keeping the look and feel of the village. Don't want it grow into a small town
- Pavements and kirb sides need to be tidied more by the council. Another bin and dog bin.
- Any development should not overwhelm existing house numbers.
- Lack of hedge maintenance, very poor when turning off from the village of Trewidland. Some landowners never cut their hedges, especially those with small pockets of land.
- Access to a community shop & community transport would be highly beneficial for all but especially older or less able people. Only then could we absorb more residents plus we need access to dr, dentist etc
- More investment in the planting of flowers etc...to help wildlife given impact of climate change on our native species.
- Reduce signage, reduce litter,
- New village hall in Trewidland
- What is the land being used for opposite the church at the road going towards the St Keyne Wel that used to be used as a recreation ground for the parish ? Houses could go there instead of the ridiculous suggestions of Penhale Lane!!
- I would like both villages to retain their rural identity. I would not like to see them become suburbs of Liskeard.
- Need to keep lane hedges back to improve lane visibility.
- Small batches of new housing up to 30, which would be absorbed into area without destroying what's already there. Then 10 years time, think again. To include a shop would be very relevant.
- St Keyne or Trewidland can't cope with the extra traffic on their roads. Horningtops would be ideal opportunity
- St Keyne has its own good facility. It has a large village hall which people do not use so why extend and spend more money on a useless building just to look good.
- I enjoy living in a village setting.

- Encouraging young families to enhance the villages and the school by increasing infrastructure in keeping with the quiet lifestyle of the villages
- Maintenance of hedges, many people have recently purchased land and are not maintaining their hedges.

- Power cuts
- Increased traffic from Horningtops to/from Trewidland makes driving challenging. More and larger passing places would be safer for drivers and pedestrians.
- The state of the village hall
- Increasing traffic on rural roads. Changes in land use/development going ahead without permission.
- Not having access to basic facilities. Worries about the growth of the village and what it might become in 20-50 years
- Hall committee not open to new ideas - the answer I got was, oh we've tried that before and it didn't go down well..... Well I say we should try more new things!
- (lack of) Access to shop, Post Office, Health Services.
- The amount of caravans being used for domestic use. Some side roads are becoming impassable. The amount of planning permission being granted for buildings on small pockets of agricultural land and is starting to make our beautiful countryside very built up.
